Learning News

Our topic this half term is Water World, where we will be exploring how we use water in the UK, and comparing this with how a water-scarce country uses water. We will then investigate the types of water that can be found on Earth, and investigating whether a local body of water is safe to drink. We will also be exploring aspects of the water cycle, which will link with our Science topic this half term, where we will be learning about the different states of matter, solid, liquid and gas, how the particles behave in each state and how states of matter can be changed and affected.

In our Art lessons, we will be exploring watercolours to create gradients, and using these to create artwork showing reflections based on Monet's Regatta at Argenteuil. In PSHE we are learning about good hygiene habits and developing healthy lifestyles, as well as how to keep safe by following rules in different situations. Our RE lessons will be focusing on different religious celebrations, investigating the stories and meanings behind them and comparing the similarities and differences between them.

In Maths, we will finish our Addition and Subtraction block of learning, exploring ways to be more efficient with our strategies. We will then move onto learning about Area, counting squares and combining shapes to find areas. Finally we will be learning about Multiplication and Division, revising children's knowledge of the 3, 4 and 8 times tables and using these facts to solve problems, before moving on to learning and using facts from the 6, 7, 11 and 12 times tables. We will also investigate how multiplying a number by 1 and 0, or dividing a number by itself or 1 affects the number.

In English our main book study is 'The Roman Record' by Paul Dowswell and our focus is 'Writing to Inform'. The children will revisit their prior learning and identify and discuss what they already know about presenting information to a reader. We will identify the most common forms of informative writing they are likely to encounter (recounts, biographies, newspaper articles and letters) and they will discuss, and look at, lots of writing similar to that which they are planning to write. We will analyse these texts so that we can understand and learn from their structure, vocabulary and grammar.

The children will specifically look at:

- Subordinating conjunctions these can be used to add more detail about important information.
- Fronted adverbials these are used to offer additional important information. The focus will be fronted adverbials of time to convey the chronology within a piece of



















writing.

- Relative clauses these are used to add in extra detail.
- Subheadings these help to make the writing easier to understand by separating sections of information.

As well as focusing on these features, the children will continue to learn how to spot grammatical features such as expanded noun phrases, use of the past tense and use of paragraphs. They will also continue to proofread and check their work for errors, and identify and reflect on what they could improve on.

Gaps in Learning

English:

- Capital letters at the beginning of sentences and for 'proper nouns'.
- Remembering to continue to use phonic knowledge to spell longer words.
- Splitting longer words into syllables and chunking parts of words together so that they are easier to remember e.g. part ic u lar → particular
- Remembering spelling rules, for example adding -ed to a regular verb to turn it into a past tense verb (jump -> jumped) or altering the root word e.g. doubling the consonant of more complex verbs (beg → begged, step → stepped)
- Proofreading written work for capital letters, spellings, punctuation and to check it makes sense.
- To try and use fronted adverbials.
- To increase the legibility, consistency and quality of their handwriting.
- To think about the layout and presentation of their work.
- Spelling homophones correctly e.g. there/their/they're, where/wear, been/bean.
- To understand what they read, in books they can read independently, by drawing simple inferences with evidence such as inferring characters' feelings.

Maths:

Automatic recall of key addition facts (shown in the table) and corresponding subtraction calculations. Automatic recall means quick recall from memory with no working out needed.
